He Makes All Things Beautiful In Its Time.

Ecclesiastes 3:1-11

For everything there is a season, a time for every activity under heaven. A time to be born and a time to die. A time to plant and a time to harvest. A time to kill and a time to heal. A time to tear down and a time to build up. A time to cry and a time to laugh. A time to grieve and a time to dance. A time to scatter stones and a time to gather stones. A time to embrace and a time to turn away. A time to search and a time to quit searching. A time to keep and a time to throw away. A time to tear and a time to mend. A time to be quiet and a time to speak. A time to love and a time to hate. A time for war and a time for peace. What do people really get for all their hard work? And not just the future of the one afflicted; it affects the lives of the families involved too. If you're watching your child suffer with a life-controlling issue, you know heartbreak. Webster's Dictionary describes Heartbreak as overwhelming sorrow or grief. Heartbreak becomes the land in which you live.

Helpless. Hopeless. Does anybody see? How do I move forward? Who will help?

My help comes from the LORD, who made heaven and earth! ... Indeed, he who watches over Israel never slumbers or sleeps. [Psalm 121: 2, 4]

Have you never heard? Have you never understood? The LORD is the everlasting God, the Creator of all the earth. He never grows weak or weary. No one can measure the depths of His understanding. He gives power to the weak and strength to the powerless. ... But those who trust in the LORD will find new strength. [Isaiah 40: 28, 29, 31]

One thing you've learned in this land of Heartbreak is that you have no control over your child's life-controlling issue. So, how do you move forward?

Trust.

Trust is a hard concept to grasp, but all it really means is Rest. Imagine dropping the heaviest backpack you've ever carried and falling back into the most comfortable bed. That's trust. It's a learned behaviour, and you might have to remind yourself over and over to drop that backpack and fall into the One who never slumbers or sleeps.

You're not alone in Heartbreak. The LORD has promised that those who trust in Him will find new strength to carry on, for as long as you need it.

COUNSELLOR'S CORE

Vulnerability by Michelle Ryken

One definition of vulnerability is, "the quality or state of being exposed to the possibility of being attacked or harmed, either physically or emotionally." Synonyms are often associated with being defenseless, weak, and helpless.

The paradox of vulnerability lies in its potential to lead us to profound connection. When we allow ourselves to feel helpless, we open the door to being met by others—invited in, loved, and supported. Embracing our neediness is not a sign of weakness; rather, it is an act of courage. It takes bravery to lower our defenses and admit, "I'm not okay, and I need help." This simple acknowledgment can be transformative, inviting healing into our lives.

As we gather around the table of community, may we choose to embrace our dependency instead of our shame. A verse that continues to bring me deep comfort is Romans 5:3-5 (ESV), "Not only that, but we rejoice in our sufferings, knowing that suffering produces endurance, and endurance produces character, and character produces hope, and hope does not put us to shame, because God's love has been poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit who has been given to us." Diving deeper into verse 5, the NLT translation writes it as "hope does not lead us to disappointment."

In our moments of weakness, God meets us right where we are, working within us to create transformation from the inside out. This process often involves shedding layers of our false selves—those carefully crafted facades we present to the world. No longer do we need to showcase a "glossy" version of ourselves; instead, we can embrace our true selves, imperfections, and all.

The reward of vulnerability is truly profound. It offers us the chance to be seen—not just in our strengths but in our messiness. It allows us to be heard, to feel fought for, to find comfort, and ultimately, to feel less alone. Being deeply known is one of the most precious gifts we can receive from those around us. So, let us lean into vulnerability. When we share our struggles, we create a space where others feel safe to share theirs. Together, we can break the chains of shame and isolation, moving towards a community built on trust, love, and mutual support.
